Background to the project

Council is developing an Open Space Development and Conservation Plan for GJ Hosken Reserve. Building on the draft master plan, and incorporating previous research and recommendations, this plan is designed to consolidate the infrastructure that is already onsite, as well as guide the future development of the reserve.

GJ Hosken Reserve is located on Blackshaws Road and runs alongside Kororoit Creek. The Hobsons Bay Open Space Strategy classifies GJ Hosken Reserve as a 'neighbourhood park'.

In undertaking the Open Space Development and Conservation Plan for GJ Hosken Reserve, Council was interested in hearing the community's thoughts on improvements along the GJ Hosken Reserve section of the Kororoit Creek, including a new nature play space and picnic facilities. The reserve is already a dog off-leash area and some new fencing and associated infrastructure is proposed.

The engagement process

The community was invited to provide feedback on the draft plan for GJ Hosken Reserve using a survey on Council's online engagement portal – Participate Hobsons Bay. he online engagement generated 452 views and received 24 contributions. In addition, 40 people also attended a community drop-in session onsite on Saturday 8 May 2021. The session also included consultation for the nearby WLJ Crofts Reserve open space improvements.

The project was also released on Council's social media outlets. Two Twitter posts were issued with a reach of 5,970 and five Facebook posts reached 9,332 people.



Of the people who registered their concerns to a dog off-leash area, their comments included:


 I regularly run/walk my dog along the river (on-leash), having an off-leash area would mean I have an off-leash area (for larger dogs) within walking distance.

- I think a dog off-leash area would be problematic for a number of reasons:
 - The main activity in the area is bike riding, typically bikes and dogs don't mix well. I would be concerned for children on bikes
 - 2) parking in the area is limited and that section of Blackshaws Road is quite busy, again not well suited
- The area is next to a high traffic area (foot and bicycle) and dog owners often do
 not put their dog back on the leash after the off-leash area. We already have
 problems with dogs off-leash all throughout the walking trail which is hard for
 cyclists and young kids. Also a lot of dog owners will drive to the reserve to walk
 their dogs and the car park is very limited.
- Would prefer it over near the toilet blocks such a big beautiful open space for dogs to run, just needs to be made safer with fencing.
- The fenced off-leash dog area creates a conflict between people using the shared path/bikeway. Dog off-lead and shared paths don't mix. The fenced off-lead dog area should be located across the road at Croft Reserve or at an alternative location that does not conflict with the shared path. The area could remain informal off-lead, but once you construct a formal fenced off-lead area you will attract a lot of people who can't control their dogs. I also don't believe the car parking would be adequate. People who use these fenced areas invariably drive to them, an example being the fenced off-lead dog area near the Newport Power Station. People drive to these areas to let their dogs exercise because they are time poor and invariably have insufficient control over their dogs to use informal off-lead area. This reinforces the argument that dog off-lead areas and bike paths are not a sensible mix. Relocating the formal fenced off-lead dog area would enable adequate car parking to be provided also at the site that is chosen.
- I don't like the dog off-leash area. We have young kids we would lose this area.

Dog off-leash area






If a fenced dog off-leash area is constructed, would you like a water/drinking fountain located here. If there any other pieces of infrastructure you think should be included?

Next steps
