Dog Park Trial Evaluation Report

This report was written by the Property, Sport and Recreation Officer following the dog park trial January to March 2017.

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Dog Park Evaluation Report

1. Introduction

A temporary dog park was trialled in Brooklyn Reserve as part of the Neighbourhood Project and enabled council to better understand whether a dog park in that specific location.

The temporary dog park fence was installed in mid January and ran for 8 weeks, until 20th March 2017. The costs, such as the dog fence, were covered by the Neighbourhood Project and the participants of the Project took responsibility for maintaining the area.

Council provided support by advising on the fence height, providing dog litter bags and lending trees and bins for the duration of the trial.

This evaluation report aims to discuss

- Who the users were, where they came from and their ages
- When was the dog park used
- How respondents used the dog park
- Whether users had seen a change in the community connectedness as a result of the dog park
- What other activities people did at Brooklyn Reserve
- What users liked and disliked about the dog park
- Whether having a dog park in Brooklyn influenced users in using other dog off leash areas in the municipality.

A survey, the use of social media and other information was used to evaluate the above.

2. Background

The dog park trial was one of three community-led placemaking projects implemented as part of the Neighbourhood Project. The Neighbourhood Project enabled Council to play a facilitation role in allowing the community to run projects in Brooklyn that would beautify underutilised spaces. The other two projects were a *Brooklyn Festive Movie Night* in December 2016 at Brooklyn Reserve and painting one of the laneways in January 2017.

A location for a dog park in Brooklyn has been a contentious issue for the Brooklyn community for several years. In 2014, Council first conducted a dog park trial at Lynch Road Reserve. This was followed by consultation on two other potential sites – Pipeline Reserve and Brooklyn Reserve in 2015. A report summarising all findings was presented to at the Ordinary Council Meeting on 9 February 2016. The outcome was that Council would investigate a suitable site for the dog park in 2016-17. The temporary dog park trial in early 2017 formed part of Council's commitment to investigate an appropriate site for use by dog owners in Brooklyn.

3. The evaluation process

Several methods were used to evaluate the temporary dog park at the west end of Brooklyn Reserve, including a survey, the use of social media and other media and correspondence to Council.

- Council undertook an evaluation using a survey (online and paper) over the eight week period. Twenty-two surveys were completed on paper and 26 were completed online.
- The Facebook page set up by the community specifically about the dog park was reviewed to better understand what people liked and did not like about the space and activities they and their dogs did there.

- A newspaper article was organised by the community which gained exposure for the project.
- Emails to the CEO and others on what they liked or did not like about the dog park were also reviewed.

4. Results

4.1 Survey


4.1.1 About the respondents



Council received 49 responses to the survey. Most (80%) said they were residents of Brooklyn and were aged between 30 and 39 years.

The responses in terms of the use of the dog park was varied, with most people attending quite regularly. Thirty-eight respondents (80%) said they spent between 30 minutes and 90

minutes at the dog park.







4.1.2 Attendance at the dog park


Most people said they attended the dog park by themselves or with another person. When asked what days of the week they attended, the most popular days were weekends and on a Monday. Less attended on Thursdays and Fridays. Most people said they attended daily, in the afternoons and evenings, with the second most common response being a few days per week. Only two people said

they attended weekly. Most (53%) of respondents said they attended the dog park with someone else.








4.1.3 How people found out about the dog park


Most respondents found out about the project through 'local knowledge' and 'going past'. Given that other options such as word of mouth or a flyer in the letterbox, it is not clear what types of other avenues people use to learn about what is happening in Brooklyn. Signs were placed at the Reserve before it went up as well as for the duration of the dog park.



4.1.4 How Brooklyn changed as a result of the dog park


In terms of the respondents' perception of the dog park and how it influenced their neighbourhood,

It is evident that the dog park had a positive influence in pride, community connectedness and that the dog park did make a difference in Brooklyn and met the community needs.




4.1.5 Other activities at Brooklyn Reserve

Most respondents said they used the Reserve to walk, jog and exercise and generally enjoy the environment. The activity that the respondents were least likely to do was tennis and use the Community Hall. This is fairly consistent with anecdotal information received as part of the Neighbourhood Project that the residents felt the tennis courts and the Hall are mostly used by non residents.



4.1.6 Using other dog parks, dog off leash areas in the municipality

In terms of whether the dog park changed people's behaviour in using other dog parks in the municipality, most (24) respondents have used other dog parks, the most likely place they attend is Altona Dog Beach. It appears that since the trial began, less respondents visited other dog parks. The most common reason for attending dog park was to cool down at the Altona dog park and meeting friends. For not attending other dog parks, the proximity of the Brooklyn dog park was the main reason respondents did not attend the others again.

4.2 Social media



A Facebook page moderated by two participants from the Neighbourhood Project.

The page was used as a tool used to communicate events, such as dog birthday parties, and capture the photos of the families, dogs and people attending the dog

park. The page was liked by 122 people.



People also commented on Council's Facebook page about the dog park being built permanently, as shown in image. See Appendix 2 for a selection of posts from the Facebook page.



4.3 Complaints and support letters

Council staff received a variety of emails in support of the dog park. They were very positive, highlighting the connectedness people felt and them meeting new neighbours. They also praised Council staff for their commitment in supporting the neighbours to trial the dog park.

Council staff also received several emails which commented on the noise of the gates, dogs barking, and the general appearance of the fence. The preferred locations appeared to be in the Kororoit Creek Trail, however due to land ownership and other issues, this place is not considered a suitable site for a dog park or dog off leash area. See appendix 3 for examples of support letters and complaints received by Council.

5. Conclusion

The dog park trial was an effective way to test a concept in a Reserve. There were some clear benefits to having the participants as part of The Neighbourhood Project involved as they helped maintain the area and have a good reach with the residents of Brooklyn. In addition, they were able to provide playing equipment, undertake the evaluation surveys and monitor the Facebook page which gave people the opportunity to ask questions.

The trial, as expected, was controversial. While a higher proportion of residents enjoyed the social aspect of the dog park, the community connectedness and the general fun space the area provided, others were not supportive of the park. It is important for Council to determine how, if a dog park is installed in this location, it will address the issues of concern.

Appendix 1 – Survey results: what respondents liked and disliked about the dog park

- great community atmosphere. My dog gets to have a run without scaring birds and i get to exercise in a friendly
 environment.
- having somewhere you can let your dog off the leash and play with other dogs.
- it is a great area to get together with people in our community and socialize our pets.
- I like that it's a smaller area so you can keep an eye out on your dog. Other off-lead dog parks are rather large which mean you can't always see what's coming or what dogs are around. I also like that it has areas for people to sit and chat and it's great as a social hang out with friends and their dogs. I also like the idea that you bring toys etc and leave them for others to enjoy. We've also met lots of people in the area and some as far away as Werribee make the trek, proving that it's really one of a kind for the west.

Disliked

- It's far too small to exercise dogs, it's noisy due to barking dogs, and it looks like a construction zone. Immediate residents should have been consulted before the pop up dog park was erected and this did not happen. This survey is totally biased towards people who want a dog park on Brooklyn reserve. There is nothing impartial about this survey and a complaint has been made about this to the council. The home owners & residents, particularly the older people, knew nothing about the survey and do not want a dog park on the Brooklyn reserve. They have signed petitions in the past to stop a dog park going up and will do it again. I have now met and spoken to almost all the home owners & residents in the immediate vicinity and we will not be steam rolled by people who want the dog park but do not live in front of it and it does not impact them directly. No respect or consideration has been given to us at all and council have been duly informed of this. The attempt to steam roll home owners and residents via the survey on Facebook & social media to obtain signatures in favour of the dog park is unfair because it prejudices people who don't use social media or the dog park. More respect & consideration of home owners is warranted and my neighbours and I will be making sure this happens in future. Please note I speak on behalf of around 25 owners & residents who do not want the dog park and knew nothing about the survey until I told them and obtained signatures from them. Final note: many of us have dogs and walk our dogs daily on Federation Trail in addition to taking them to the off leash parks at Altona beach & Cruickshank's Park. We are not opposed to dog parks of an appropriate size in an appropriate space as long as they do not impact the views and quiet & peaceful enjoyment of neighbouring properties.





Brooklyn residents and their pooches are celebrating a pop-up dog park under a project aimed at revitalising the suburb.

The \$60,000 Brooklyn Neighbourhood Project is a joint initiative of Hobsons Bay council and CoDesign Studio to establish three community-led initiatives that transform underutilised land and bring the community together.

Under the project, a temporary off-leash dog park has been established at Brooklyn Reserve.
