


Origin

Central and Western China, Afghanistan, Taiwan, and the Philippines.

Characteristics

- Small, deciduous foliage with great autumn colour in shades of orange, yellow and red.
- Bark is dark grey with shallow furrows.
- Capable of withstanding relatively harsh conditions.
- Interesting pinnate leaves emerge green and leathery and although inconspicuous, clusters of small white flowers are borne in summer, followed by red drupes which mature to blue on female trees.





Origin

Central New South Wales, from the Hunter River south to Nowra.

Characteristics

- Dwarf version of Corymbia eximia.
- Attractive yellow-brown rough bark. with profuse white flowers for short period in early spring.
- Fruit are thick and urn shaped.
- Flowers prolifically and attracts native birds, bees and bats.
- Tree is relatively tidy in appearance, and sheds relatively little debris (bark, leaves or fruits).
